Always in the Dark is a deeply moving memoir that tells of secrets, scandal and survival. In the decades between the Berlin Conference that partitioned Africa and the opening of the African Hall at the American Museum of Natural History, Americans in several fields and from many backgrounds argued that Africa had something to teach them.
